Note that to successfully sound out the words, students will need to be familiar with the consonant sounds in the English alphabet, the consonant blends, and the consonant digraphs. Charts to help students learn these sounds are included at the end of the book. The "Alphabet Sounds" chart lists all the alphabet letters and includes a word that begins with each letter and an appropriate illustration. To review each sound, name the letter, identify the sound, and then read the illustrated word. (If you have the eBook version, you can click on the arrow to hear this information in the form of a tune. Paperback readers can hear the tune by visiting the

Habakkuk Educational Materials website and clicking on "Phonics Songs" from the homepage.) The pauses in the recording are to give students the opportunity to repeat what is heard. Following the page with the alphabet chart, there is also a chart with consonant blends and a chart with consonant digraphs and trigraphs that can be reviewed in a similar manner. Please note also that any silent consonants at the beginning of words have been crossed out to assist students with the pronunciation and to help them recognize those consonant digraphs in which only one of the consonants is sounded (e.g., kn as in knit).
